2. NEW VA SECRETARY SWORN IN:

On February 14, 2017, Dr. David J. Shulkin was sworn in as the new secretary of the U. S. Department of Veterans Affairs. Prior to his unanimous (the only unanimous confirmation so far) confirmation as secretary, Shulkin served as the VA's under secretary for Health for 18 months, leading the VA Health Care System, the nation's largest healthcare system. (Note: Bob Supak posted an article about Shulkin on 2/6/2017 to our WA 1069 web site)

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3. YOUR VOICE DOES COUNT & THE TOXIC EXPOSURE ACT OF 2015:

The Chapter members signed a resolution at the 6/10/2015 meeting endorsing the Toxic Exposure Research Act Of 2015. The bill was passed by both houses of Congress and was signed by President Obama on 12/16/2016. It will establish the groundwork for research on the health issues of children and grandchildren of Vietnam veterans and, other veterans who were exposed to toxic substances. If you feel your child or grandchild suffers from birth defects related to a veteran's exposure to Agent Orange or any other toxin, YOU SHOULD DO THE FOLLOWING:

- File a claim with your VSO and expect it to be denied but get your children and grandchildren in the VA system.
- Educate your physicians of your exposure to toxic substances (Agent Orange) and request this military exposure be included in your medical records.
- As With ALL your military records, you need to protect them!
- Register with Birth Defect Research for Children at birthdefects.org. This
 independent nonprofit registry, tracks the health of the children and grandchildren
 of Vietnam veterans. Call (407) 895-0802 for more information about the registry.

4. PRESUMPTION ESTABLISHED FOR MARINES AT CAMP LEJEUNE:

Presumption of service connection of 8 diseases associated with exposure to contaminants in the water supply at camp Lejeune, N.C. for active duty, reserve and National Guard members who served for a minimum of 30 days (cumulative) between August 1, 1953 and December 31, 1987 has been established. The eight conditions are:

- adult leukemia
- aplastic anemia (and other myelodysplastic syndromes)
- bladder cancer
- kidney cancer
- liver cancer
- multiple myeloma
- non-Hodgin's lymphoma
- Parkinson's disease. (Note: Bob .Supak posted this on our VVA web site on 1/15/2017)

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EXPLANATION OF DISTRIBUTION OF VA BENEFITS AND SERVICES

CATEGORIES FOR FISCAL YEARS 2005-2015 FOR WHARTON COUNTY

COMPENSATION & PENSION (\$8,322,000 for FY 2015)

- Disability compensation for a veteran for a service-connected disease or injury can vary from \$133.57 to over \$5,616 a month.
- Non service-connected pension for a veteran can vary, from \$1,075 to \$2,127 a month.
- A survivor's pension for a surviving family member of a deceased veteran can vary from \$721 to \$1,417 a month.
- A surviving family member of a deceased veteran can receive Dependency Indemnity Compensation That amounts up to \$1,257.95 a month.

EDUCATION AND VOCATIONAL EMPLOYMENT (\$442,000 for FY 2015)

- There are seven Educational and Vocational Employment Programs that provide direct compensation to veterans: One of these is the Post 9/11 G.I. Bill that provides veterans a monthly allowance of \$1,110 a month, a stipend of \$1,000 for books and supplies per year and all tuition and fees paid for an in-state student (\$3,000 a year at WCJC).
- A grant of \$20,174.68 toward the purchase of a vehicle is available for eligible veterans. This an "Automobile and Adaptive Equipment" grant.

INSURANCE AND INDEMNITIES (\$205,000 .for FY 2015)

• A disabled veteran can purchase up to \$10,000 from 9 different VA term life insurance policies and under certain circumstances purchase up to an additional \$30,000.

MEDICAL CARE (\$9,232,000 for FY 2015) Medical Care includes dollars for medical services, medical administration, facility maintenance, educational support, research support, and overhead items. Medical Care is allocated to the patient's home location, not site of care.

- Medicine is provided with co-pays ranging from zero to \$11 for a 30 day supply; travel reimbursement@ \$0.415/mile; lodging and per diem is payable in some cases.
- Medical services, include medical exams, Immunizations; counseling services, eyeglasses, hearing aids, dental services, Home improvement Grants (\$6,800), Clothing allowances (\$777.29/yr), Home Health Services, prosthetic equipment, hospice services, burial benefits, adult day care, and state veterans homes.
